



— “Something’s Pretty Dagon Fishy!” —

You may've never heard the name, "Dagon." Most of those who've been in church since childhood can't recall having heard it. Many of their clergymen can't, either. It'll be hard for you to forget that name, though, after you read what follows here...

Per Judges 16:23, Dagon was worshiped by the Philistines. (David killed the Philistine giant, Goliath, with a rock and slingshot.) Dagon was also the primary god of the Babylonians. Although we haven't been able to confirm it, many scholars claim the Ninevites worshipped Dagon. (Nineveh is where Jonah didn't want to go.)

In Chaldean times the head of the church was the personal representative of Dagon. That church leader was seen as infallible. People had to kiss his ring and his slipper. He was addressed as "Your Holiness." Like Roman super-clerics, today, Dagon's priests also wore the fish mitre and pompous robes.

The fish mitre? It's a hat that resembles Dagon's open mouth and head. Dagon was a fish-god who emerged from the sea. Best we can figure, he was a *talking* fish. He had to be a smooth-talking fish, too! He was able to convince large populations of supposedly civilized people that, scales and all, he was a god.

The Roman church replaced the false-god name, "Dagon," with the name "Ichthus," meaning "fish" in Greek^{Strong's H-2486}. They claim it's an acrostic for **I**esous **C**hristos **T**Heos **U**ios **S**oter—"Jesus Christ God Son Savior," in English. Many Bible and church history scholars have concluded that it's simply the Romans' clever way of continuing their clandestine Dagon worship.
